A Warning To All Hairdressers

Could the C-19 jab be responsible for this – rather than Covid?

- 1 Having Covid-19 can cause people to develop new allergies, according to the BBC.
Hairdressers across the UK, using the same hair dye on clients as they did before the clients had Covid, have reported that some people are now suffering rashes and burns from their hair colour.
- 2 The hairdressers' and beauticians' trade body, the National Hair and Beauty Federation, has issued a warning to its members to always carry out patch tests at least 48 hours before putting colour on clients' hair. This is to avoid allergic reactions - and possible legal action against hairdressers.
- 3 Oddly, [the BBC says in the article](#) that scientists at Imperial College in London are researching how [Covid-19 might be reprogramming our immune system](#).
But the BBC does not give a link to the [Imperial College](#) study.
I looked on the Net but did not find any mention of this research.
- 4 There is another oddity in the BBC article, as well.
[The National Hair and Beauty Federation says:](#)
"There is no scientific evidence that just having COVID causes allergic reaction to hair colour or any other treatments...
How puzzling.
These two oddities – the Imperial College research and the link between Covid and new allergies - is a subject for another article, in which I will apply Dr James' Truth Coefficient process to the BBC's article [see **1395 BE**].
Meanwhile...
- 5 The need for patch tests before colouring hair is clear. The National Hair and Beauty Federation [NHBF] explains that [people can have an allergic reaction due to a number of factors](#), of which a compromised immune system is just one. As a result, their industry protocol is to test every client every six months - even if the client has not changed their hair colour - and to test before every appointment if clients change colour or shade or go to a new hair salon.
The test needs to be done at least 48 hours before the appointment for each separate toner, shade and product from different manufacturers.
- 6 Although [the NHBF recommends](#) that all colour treatments are carried by professional hairdressers, a lot of people colour their own hair at home.
The NHBF says that the manufacturer's instructions include the need to carry

out a test before using the hair dye.

7 So, this warning is not just for our professional hairdressers and stylists, but to us others also, who do the job at home out of a packet.

8 Finally, given that the Covid-19 tinkers with our immune system - and also our genes - how come the jab is not being considered as the cause of this problem. It is certainly worth raising the question. And we are raising it.
